- > learn about cultural heritage and traditions

History Students

- > engage with personal / family / community stories
- explore Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' sources and texts for cultural narratives and values
- construct timelines to represent significant events
- research local historical figures who have contributed to the community
